

THE HISTORY OF WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP SCAVENGER HUNT



- 1 Behind the Senate chamber is a "cloakroom," which is now set up to celebrate the first woman elected to the Oregon State Senate. What was her name and in which year was she elected?
- 2 Bonus questions from the cloakroom: How many times did Oregon's women put the right to vote on the ballot before it passed? How many years before the 19th Amendment did Oregon women have the right to vote?
- 3 Oregon's first female governor is a lifetime Girl Scout! Find her official portrait and take a photo. What's her name and in which year was she elected governor?
- 4 Eight of Oregon's industries are represented in four murals in the stairways in the rotunda. Two of the people represented are women. Which industries are they representing?
- 5 Around the top of the Senate and House chambers are names of famous Oregonians. Find Marie Aioe Dorion in the Senate, a Native American woman from Iowa and the wife of an interpreter, who crossed the plains and settled in Oregon in 1810. In the House, find Tabitha Brown, known as the "Mother of Oregon." She was founder of a home and boarding school for orphan children of pioneers at West Tualatin, now Forest Grove. It later became the campus of Pacific University.
