BACKGROUND

Girl Scouts offers supportive environments free from the pressures and social anxiety that can result from a mixed-gender environment. Through hands-on, girl-led, girl-centered programs, Girl Scouts try new things, develop a range of skills and step into leadership roles.

From the boardroom to the courtroom to the caucus room, the need for female leadership has never been clearer or more urgent than it is today.

GOLD AWARD GIRL SCOUT—The Girl Scout Gold Award—the most prestigious award a Girl Scout can earn—calls upon girls to utilize these skills as they transform their ideas and vision for change into sustainable community projects tackling issues such as poverty, illiteracy and the environment.

G.I.R.L. AGENDA—GIRLS SCOUTS' CIVIC ENGAGEMENT PROGRAM—In October 2017, Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. launched the G.I.R.L. GIRL SCOUT COMMITMENT TO STEM— Girl Scouts of the U.S.A. is committed to increasing girls' opportunities to explore and build career paths in the fields of Science , Technology , Engineering and Math (STEM). The Girl Scout STEM Pledge is a multiyear initiative to put 2.5 million girls through hands-on STEM programs by 2025.

In April, GSOSW introduced STEM Month which featured JavaScript Game Design, Seeking our Senses, Bugging at Wildlife Images, Digital Media Studio: Movie Maker, Wonderful Whales at Umpqua Discovery Center, Minecraft Build Challenge with Microsoft and OMSI Family Science Night.

An upcoming example of GSOSW STEM programming is **ASTRONOMY ADVENTURE**. In June, our council is hosting a group of 10 girls from across the USA for the "Astronomy Adventure" Destination. The girls will join astronomers at the Pine Mountain Observatory for solar observing by day, deep sky observing by night, and camping under the stars in the beautiful Deschutes National Forest of Central Oregon. They'll learn to operate the telescopes, collect data, learn how to manipulate data into an image, and explore fun astronomy activities. They'll join University of Oregon undergraduate women, the Observatory Director, and other professional instructors to develop STEM skills and learn about careers in astronomy.

GSOSW OUTDOOR PROGRAMMING—More Than 80 Overnight Camp Sessions

An upcoming example of GSOSW Outdoor programming is **GIRLS IN THE WOODS 2018**. In late July, there is a five-day overnight camp hosted by U.S. Forest Service staff. Girls get the chance to practice orienteering, fire building and leave no trace principles as well as learn about nature, conservation and restoration efforts.
