Silver Award Girl Scouts

Silver Award Girl Scouts and sisters Sophia and Olivia Thornburg wanted to increase access to books and bring their community together safely, so they built a Little Free Library book-sharing box in their hometown of La Grande, Oregon. They collected books to stock the library, and practiced project management and construction skills through the building process. Bronze Award Girl Scouts

Bronze Award Girl Scouts Ava and Keira of Troop 12811 are passionate about dogs, and wanted to inform their community about how to keep them safe. The girls created an educational flier teaching dog owners about poisonous flowers commonly planted in Portland, as well as how quickly temperatures inside a car can get hot or cold. The flier was distributed at pet stores, veterinary offices, and pet rescue/adoption agencies. In 2020, 148 girls earned the Girl Scout Bronze Award—the highest award for girls grades 4-5. 


